Watching the likes of the Olympics and the Paralympics just shows what can be achieved through passion, hard work and teamwork.

Whilst we aren't able to hand out medals, we would like to give a massive "thank you" to the whole team behind soft plastic recycling. A huge thanks to consumers who take the time to separate out their clean soft plastic and then drop it off at participating stores; the teams at each of the stores who keep their eyes on the recycling bins, then transfer the bin liners to the back of their stores and, in many instances, also baling the soft plastics ready for collection; to our members who fund the whole recycling process from collection through to processing; to our collectors and service providers who go above and beyond to ensure that the supply chain flows

efficiently; and last, but definitely not least, to Future Post who are pumping out plastic fence posts and other products made from the soft plastics we collect.

Looking back on the past 12 months for soft plastics, we can report progress against every measure, and that is thanks to our great team. In July we launched soft plastic collection bins for the first time in the Hawke's Bay. Around 30 people joined us for the launch at The Warehouse Hastings where we showcased a Future Post vegetable garden frame in-store within the garden centre. This proved immensely popular with shoppers and demonstrates very clearly how plastic bags, including the likes of garden compost and growing media bags, can be recycled back into garden products.

Shoppers in the Kapiti Coast are also delighted to see soft plastic recycling bins return to stores in the region.

Lastly, while writing this issue, the country returned to Alert Level 4. We have suspended all collections during Level 4 and will only resume collections when regions return to Level 2. Our collectors are not able to collect, "non-essential" stores are closed; and supermarkets must focus resources on meeting the essential needs of their communities. More than ever we recognise that packaging is there to protect and preserve our food and grocery products. We believe passionately in being able to offer Kiwis the opportunity to recycle their soft plastics. We would like to say thank you, again, to all our members that are also essential services who keep operating over this lockdown period; and to the whole team behind the scheme for their understanding and patience while we follow the government guidelines and Covid-19 protocols.

SOFT PLASTIC RECYCLING HAWKE'S BAY LAUNCH

We were fortunate that we were able to launch, and bed down, Soft Plastic Recycling in the Hawke's Bay before August's lockdown period.

Sandra Hazlehurst, Mayor of Hastings and Kirsten Wise, Mayor of Napier welcomed members of The Packaging Forum's Soft Plastic Recycling Scheme to the region on 12 July to launch the new collection service.

The event was held at The Warehouse Hastings, and a big shout out must go to The Warehouse Regional Manager, Ivan Pope, and Sustainability Manager, Yi You, and to the whole The Warehouse Hastings team.

The bins are at The Warehouse stores in Hastings and Napier South; Countdown stores in Hastings, Napier (Munroe Street); Napier South (Carlyle) and Waipukurau; Pak'nSave Tamatea Napier, and New World Havelock North and Waipukurau.

We are also delighted to offer soft plastic recycling to customers using the Environment Centre Hawke's Bay. The Environment Centre is a community service which we are proud to support.

Sandra Hazlehurst, Mayor of Hastings welcomed the initiative:

"It's great to see Hastings and wider Hawke's Bay included in the Soft Plastic Recycling Scheme and I encourage all residents to use the collection bins at their nearest participating store. It has been very challenging for our community to be unable to recycle these plastics until now. I see this as a very positive step by these retailers who, working with Future Post, are taking responsibility for collecting and finding a new use for soft plastic packaging. They are to be congratulated."

Kirsten Wise, Mayor of Napier added:

"It is fantastic for the citizens of Napier to have the opportunity to recycle their soft packaging locally; and know that it will be destined for recycling into a useful product. Napier City Council supports this initiative and the opportunity it provides to our ratepayers and customers, and are excited about the increased ability to recycle more types of plastic in the Hawke's Bay."

MINISTRY RELEASES LONG AWAITED REPORT ON RECYCLING LABELLING OPTIONS FOR NEW ZEALAND

The Ministry for the Environment commissioned Martin Jenkins to develop recommendations on options for national recyclability labelling on packaging. Find out more at bit.ly/TWU821-01

This report provides initial analysis on options for labelling and provides recommendations for how a national labelling standard could be taken forward in New Zealand.

We are pleased to see the report recommend that the ARL should form the basis of a New Zealand recycling label. This reinforces our work to integrate our scheme within the ARL and the PREP tool. Over 35% of our members are already using the ARL.

BREAD TAGS – REDUCING PLASTIC CONSUMPTION

Great to see our leading bread companies replacing plastic tags with cardboard tags this month.

George Weston Foods say that this measure will eliminate 18 million plastic tags in the first year. The new tags will be on Ploughmans Bakery and Burgen bread.

Goodman Fielder's Nature's Fresh are using recyclable cardboard bread tags on bread loaves from its Auckland bakery. The progressive roll out will move through its network of bakeries throughout New Zealand.



SORBENT TISSUES – INCREASING RECYCLED CONTENT IN PACKAGING

Spotted these tissues on the shelves. The packaging is made from a minimum of 30% recycled plastic, and of course can be recycled in our soft plastic bins.



GOODMAN FIELDER – NATURE'S FRESH SUPPORTS SOFT PLASTIC RECYCLING





MY FOOD BAG

My Food Bag's soft plastic recycling programme is delivering results. Over 10,000 foodies have taken part in the programme returning over 1200kg of soft plastics for recycling into posts. It's a simple process, customers order a courier bag when they choose their weekly food bag, fill it with clean soft plastics (all household soft plastics accepted); seal the bag and either arrange a pick up with NZ Post or drop off at the post office.

ACROSS NEW ZEALAND & NOW TO AUSTRALIA

Up to 80 tonnes of posts were distributed by Future Post in the first week of August. To put this in perspective, this has diverted the equivalent of around 1.1 million two litre milk bottles, and 11 million plastic bags or wrappers. These posts are off to wineries in Blenheim and a kiwifruit development in Kerikeri. Future Post are also now exporting posts to Australia.



FUTURE POST TO RECYCLE SINGLE-USE FACE MASKS FROM AIRPORTS & TRANSPORT HUBS



Future Post announced in August that it's set to start recycling single-use face masks, with immediate capacity to take five million a month from commercial businesses. Currently single-use face masks, an essential item given Covid-19, are filling up rubbish bins in airports and other public transport facilities, and are often found littering roadsides. By recycling these face masks from transport hubs, and turning them in to fence posts, Future Post is helping to divert tonnes of this single-use plastic item from landfill.

To support the public's growing interest in the Soft Plastic Recycling Scheme, and to clarify what can and can't be recycled – we produced this poster to be displayed at collection points. Not only does it look good, but helps us to ensure only what we can recycle is placed in the collection bins to reduce, and avoid, contamination.

RAISING AWARENESS

Every year we have an independent review of our media coverage to track our performance delivering key messages. In the Year to 30 June 2021, there were 105 news articles mentioning the scheme (double the previous year) with a potential reach of 2.37 million people. 37% of media coverage is in daily newspapers; 32% online and 19% in business media, 5% TV and radio.
