Aotearoa, we now have more
recycling drop off points in
our holiday destinations.

As we approach the end of 2022, we thought it would be nice to have a little reminder of the year that was for soft plastics...

Thank you again to all our members, collectors and processing partners for making this scheme possible. We've added **76** new stores – that's a **74%** increase and we now have collection bins at more than **250** locations.

We've continued to increase our membership by 20% to over 180 members and 1 in 5 of our members is now from outside the food and grocery sector.

This year New
Zealanders have
recycled over **500** tonnes
of soft plastic, which is the
equivalent to **76 million** bags or
wrappers; and **50,000** Future Posts
have been produced - enough
to fence **250km** of roads all
the way from Auckland
to Kerikeri.



#### **JANUARY**

Future Post added a second production line at its Auckland plant doubling its processing capacity.

**saveBOARD** opened its plant in the Waikato to turn liquid fibreboard cartons and soft plastic into low carbon building products.





## **FEBRUARY**

## INTRODUCING SOFT PLASTIC RECYCLING IN HAURAKI DISTRICT

Hauraki District Council celebrated the introduction of soft plastic recycling at Ngatea Four Square, Waihi New World, Hauraki Repair & Reuse Centre, the council's two refuse transfer stations, as well as Countdown in Paeroa.

#### **MARCH**

Around **2.17 million** kiwis now know about soft plastic recycling (Source Horizon Research).

Soft plastic recycling returned to Dunedin thanks to local business partnerships with collection bins at eight participating Countdown, New World and The Warehouse stores across Dunedin and Mosgiel. Since March we recycled 12 tonnes of soft plastic, or around 2 million bags or wrappers. However, we had to suspend the service in November because we no longer have access to a baler to compact the plastic for safe and efficient onward transport. We are working on an alternative solution for 2023.

The Ministry for the Environment also released its Transforming Recycling Consultation documents, to which the Soft Plastic Recycling Scheme submitted a response on behalf of members.



Partnership between NZ Post, The Warehouse, New World & Sealed Air opens the scheme to communities currently without access to a SP recycling bin, or who are unable to get to their local store to drop off their soft plastic. So far 1000s have sent filled bags back via the NZ Post courier network, with the bags being picked up by Abilities Group; baled and transported to Future Post for recycling





#### MAY

#### THE CLEAN, DRY + EMPTY MESSAGE IS WORKING

The Waste Not Consulting audit finds a big annual drop in contamination levels from **8.7% to 4.2%**. The main items for contamination were rigid plastics, paper, and compostable bags.

#### JUNE

## CONTINUING OUR EXPANSION

Our community partner **Earthlink** extended its collection network to enable collections in the Wairarapa; and we finally got to Thames via a partnership with the Thames Coromandel District Council and Smart Environmental. The Thames service has proved so successful that we have expanded collections to Whangamatā and Whitianga – just in time for the very busy festive holiday season.



#### JULY

### MORE BINS PER CAPITA IN

We celebrated mid-winter and Plastic Free July on a beautiful sunny day in Tauranga. Tauranga is now the city with the most collection points per capita – **one bin per 10,000** people compared to an average of one bin per 17,000 in other participating cities.

And in Hamilton, **saveBOARD** turns our soft plastic into building materials by mixing it with liquid paper board, and using the soft plastic as the glue to bond the products to create low carbon building materials.

## DESIGN BEGINS FOR PLASTIC PACKAGING PRODUCT SCHEME

The Minister for the Environment, Hon David Parker announces that TPF and the NZ Food & Grocery Council will jointly lead the project to co-design a Plastic Packaging Product Stewardship Scheme. The co-design process will involve multiple stakeholders over two year to identify and recommend the most fitting scheme for NZ.



#### OCTOBER

### SOFT PLASTIC RECYCLING

Tairāwhiti residents are now able to recycle their soft plastic packaging for the first time. Thanks to local Tairāwhiti bakers Walter Findlay who collect the soft plastic from six participating stores and bale it ready for transport to Auckland leveraging Goodman Fielder's transport network.



#### NOVEMBER

#### A REMINDER THAT WE ARE NOWHERE WITHOUT OUR PROCESSING PARTNERS

The temporary cessation of collections by REDcycle in Australia is a reminder that we need to invest and grow our NZ processing capacity. Three years ago, we had to stop our store collection service because we had nowhere to send the plastic. We are now back at 80% coverage, the result of working together with our processing partners, **Future Post** and **saveBOARD**.



# DECEMBER CELEBRATING SEVEN YEARS OF SOFT PLASTIC RECYCLING

We have worked hard in 2022 to bring soft plastic recycling to our hot spot tourist destinations with the distinctive recycling bins now available in Paihia, Kerikeri, Tauranga, Hawke's Bay, Tairāwhiti, Taupō, Whitianga, Whangamatā, Waihi, Kapiti Coast, Wairarapa and Akaroa.
