Collaborating for success

In July, I participated in the Environmental Packaging Live conference at the Oval in London, and the AIP NZ Packaging Forum which took place this month at the Foodtech Packtech expo at the Auckland Showgrounds. Although these events were hosted in venues located on opposite sides of the globe, they shared a common focus: Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR).



Speakers in the United Kingdom discussed the significant challenges and stresses associated with packaging reform, as the implementation of EPR introduces producer fees in addition to the existing Packaging Recovery Note (PRN) system and the plastic tax.

In New Zealand, discussions focused on the need for EPR reform, aligning with Australia, and meeting global standards.

There was overall consensus that the circular economy for flexible packaging / soft plastics is challenging, and we must collaborate to get to where we need to be. Key concerns include recycled content, feedstock quality, end markets, and increasing circularity. Labelling is critical to make decision making as simple as possible for consumers.

Clear and consistent labelling through systems like the OPRL in the UK, or the ARL in Australia and New Zealand is essential to help consumers make informed decisions.

To drive alignment with Australia, we are working with Soft Plastics Stewardship Australia (SPSA) on a Heads of Agreement for both schemes. We continue our partnership with the Flexcollect alliance in the UK, which has recently published its approach for kerbside flexible plastic collection. This document outlines a comprehensive framework for integrating flexible plastics into existing household kerbside collections, in anticipation of the UK's mandated rollout of flexible plastic collections commencing in 2027.

Two Nations, One Purpose



JOINT WEBINAR WITH SOFT PLASTIC STEWARDSHIP AUSTRALIA

In July, we held a joint webinar with SPSA co-CEO Barry Cosier and executive leader Oscar Nicholson to share updates, compare our schemes, and discuss recent EPR developments. The webinar is available to members on the Packaging Forum's membership portal.

The ACCC has now issued a draft determination proposing to grant authorisation to the SPSA to establish a voluntary industry led scheme to collect and recycle soft plastic packaging. A huge amount of effort has gone into achieving this milestone and we congratulate the SPSA team.

GLOBAL INSIGHTS

J&B Recycling, Hartlepool UK

One of the highlights of my "work related" time in the UK has been visiting the team at JB Recycling in Hartlepool. Soft plastic is collected from households in the Newcastle region trial in blue "survival" bags which are picked out at the pre-sort area of the MRF. The post-consumer soft plastic is baled and sent to UK based plastic reprocessors. There are 13 local authorities that feed into the MRF in a fully commingled collection system.

The MRF has also introduced robots to pick out food and beverage cartons for recycling.

The kerbside recycling trials operate alongside store drop off recycling solutions with soft plastic recycling bins at all major UK supermarkets.

A 30%+ reuse future for the UK

The research by Go Unpackaged looked at developing a pathway to achieve a 30% reuse rate target in UK grocery retail (so packaging would be reused over 30 times to be deemed reusable).

The group included Amcor, Biffa, Chep, DEFRA, Ecosurety, Ocada Retail, Suez Recycling, Tesco and Wrap. The research modelled seven scenarios being: current single use, single use with deposit return scheme, citizen return to store, online – reusables with delivery and collection by existing

online retail delivery vehicles, 3PL kerbside collection, council kerbside collection, and refill instore. 27 categories were modelled including products packaged in soft plastic such as biscuits and snack foods, coffee, rice and salads and vegetables. The modelling indicated that three reuse systems – online, 3PL kerbside and council kerbside, cost less to manage than single use systems.

Wales shares the top global spot for recycling municipal waste

Dr Andy Reed, Head of Waste Strategy at the Welsh Government told delegates that Wales is ranked joint leader in recycling with an overall 59% recycling rate, the same as Austria. Wales published its first Collections Blueprint in 2011, and the recently released Collections Blueprint reflects the change in approach to collection and sortation. The new kerbside collection recommendations include soft plastic with the requirements under the packaging EPR to collect flexible plastic films from kerbside from 2027. Wales has championed a 6-bin household collection system with a kerbside sort into compartmentalised vehicles to produce reliable highquality feedstock. This has resulted in investment into plastic recycling systems such as the Jayplas plant in Swansea.

FPF FlexCollect Report 2025 — Flexible Plastic Fund

The Flexible Plastic Fund (FPF) has launched its FlexCollect report, which consolidates over three years of learnings from the trials, which took place across 10 pilot local authorities and 160,000 households. The project was the largest of its kind in the UK, collecting over 400 tonnes of post-consumer soft plastic - the equivalent of over 50 million bread bags. The report sets out a clear blueprint for adding flexible plastic to existing household recycling - showing that these materials can be effectively collected across all service types, sorted through existing facilities and achieve high recovery rates with end markets for the recycled material. The key learnings from the FlexCollect report are:

- Collections are easy to implement: FPP can be effectively collected across all service types with minimal to no disruption using dedicated bags or in some instances, loose combined with other recyclable materials.
- There is strong public support and participation: The scheme proved popular with residents, achieving an impressive 89% satisfaction rate amongst surveyed householders.
- High-quality material was collected: Nearly 90% of the collected material (including collection bags) was target material and it was very clean - demonstrating good sorting behaviour and low contamination.
- Minimal disruption to sorting facilities: All participating Materials Recovery Facilities

(MRFs) successfully accepted and processed the FPP, with little to no impact on their existing operations. Modifications, where necessary, were relatively straightforward to implement. Collection and sorting are low-cost for local authorities: Collection costs range between £1.96 to £3.14 per household, per year, whilst sorting costs are between £0.17 and £0.64 per household, per year.

UK plastic tax revenue down 3% as recycled content in packaging rises

Receipts collected by HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) in the financial year 2024 to 2025 totalled £259 million, decreasing by 3% compared to 2023 to 2024 which totalled £268 million. As of 6 August 2025, there were 4,927 businesses registered to the plastic packaging tax (PPT). Of the total tonnage of plastic packaging manufactured in and imported into the UK in the financial year 2024 to 2025, 38% was declared as taxable under the PPT. Industry groups, such as Recoup, have expressed concerns that the absence of a robust verification system and enforcement of recycled content claims undermines the competitiveness of the UK plastic packaging sector. The current tax framework lacks effective mechanisms to validate these claims, particularly with respect to imported plastic packaging manufactured abroad.

European Commission Single Use Plastics Directive - Public consultation on rules for calculating, verifying and reporting recycled content in single-use plastic beverage

EXPRA and EPRO jointly responded to the European Commission's draft rules on the Single-Use Plastics Directive, which govern how recycled content in singleuse plastic bottles is calculated and reported. The associations stress that clear regulations are necessary to encourage investment in recycling technologies, especially since expanding chemical recycling will take significant time and resources. They call for swift adoption of these regulations to drive progress toward a circular plastics economy.

European plastic recycling industry facing 'imminent collapse', says Plastics Recyclers Europe

Plastics recycling plant closures are increasing rapidly in Europe. According to Plastics Recyclers Europe (PRE), between January and July 2025, capacity losses nearly matched those of all 2024 and were triple 2023's figures. The Netherlands, Germany, and the UK have been hit hardest, with recent planned closures including Viridor and Biffa in the UK, Veolia in Germany, and Cedo in the Netherlands.

LEADING THE WAY TO A CIRCULAR ECONOMY FOR PLASTIC

Wales to become first to launch digital deposit return scheme using Polytag technology

Wales is set to implement a digital deposit return scheme (DDRS), becoming the first country to do so. The Welsh government has announced the inclusion of a digital solution alongside a 'return-toretail' model that utilises reverse vending machines (RVMs). The DDRS rollout in Wales is planned for October 2027, in coordination with other UK nations. This system will employ Polytag technology, enabling consumers to reclaim deposits through existing kerbside recycling infrastructure. The digital option allows consumers to avoid storing and transporting empty packaging to return points.

UK government confirms local authority payments under Packaging EPR system

Defra has released a list of expected payment amounts for UK local authorities under extended producer responsibility for packaging (pEPR). The £1.1 billion generated by pEPR will fund recycling services, with most payments—ranging into the millions—set for distribution in November.
